"Montgolfier" Hot Air Balloon Theatrical Ring

This piece is a 2nd year design and make exercise. The brief was to design and make a large theatrical ring that can be seen on a stage from 10 meters away. The ring had to incorporate six carnelian cabochon gemstones. The piece is made from sterling silver and the top half of the balloon can be opened to house a small LED light to backlight the carnelian cabs.

This ring is a tribute to the Montgolfier Brothers who were the inventors of the hot air balloon. The inspiration came from sketches of early balloon designs from the late 18th century. I gave the balloon's gondola an industrial steampunk look which fits in with the Victorian era but gives a modern twist. As this balloon will never fly it is therefore tethered to the ground depicting the moment just before lift-off.







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
